He has had 4 months experience with Ray Cons Copper Co. in charge of cleaning the plant. Asked whether he is now or has ever been a member of the Western Federation of Miners, W. Forest answers "No." Nor does he belong to any other labor organization. How long in this District? 4 days. As a reference, he names W.H. Doyier of Canon City, Ok. He declares that he is "in sympathy with the objects and purposes of the Miners' Protective Association [and] will abide by and observe the Constitution...and By-Laws as may be prescribed by its Executive Committee, and signs his declaration as W. *Mining in the Cripple Creek District began in 1891. Soon after, miners and the companies they worked for had violent encounters over pay and conditions, leading in 1893 to formation of the Western Federation of Miners, referred to in this document. Tensions between management and workers escalated to the Colorado Labor Wars of 1903. Matters were never settled, and*

*Created in 1946, the American Christian Palestine Committee (ACPC) was designed to educate American Christian leaders about the post-Holocaust need for a Jewish state. After Israel's creation in 1948, the ACPC now worked to draw attention to Jewish accomplishments in the new state, fight anti-Semitism, and confirm the necessity for the country's existence. Over 20,000 Christian leaders, mostly Protestants, were ACPC members, and the leadership included Mormon Sen. William King and Protestant Sen. (later ambassador to the U.N., etc.) Henry Cabot Lodge. Chief among ACPC activities were sponsoring seminars; publishing educational materials; creating a Speaker's Bureau of over 300 non-Jewish speakers who could be called on for events held at churches, universities, community groups, etc.; and conducting study tours of the new Israel and adjoining Arab lands for religious leaders and journalists. The group's activities were counteracted by the pro-Arab group American Friends of the Middle East, founded in 1951 and later proven to be budgeted in large part by the CIA. The ACPC wound*

down its educational/informational programs in the late 1950s-early 1960s, when the Israeli embassy and consulates took over the task. ~~ This scrapbook documents one such ACPC-sponsored trip (March 31-April 28, 1951), whose stated goals include making a "comprehensive study of Arab-Israel problems", in the course of its visit to Israel, Jordan and Lebanon, including the first ACPC tour visit to Palestinian refugee camps. The group's "hosts" included Prime Minister of Israel David Ben-Gurion, Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan Foreign Minister Achmed Tooqan, and American Ambassador to Israel Monnet Davis, as well various government and university officials and city mayors. One stated goal was to assess "suggested solutions for the resettlement of these tragic [Palestinian] victims of the Arab-Israel War of 1948." The scrapbook was compiled by one of the 22 tour participants, Harrison Fry, Religious Editor of the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin. The 26 thick, octavo notebooks are written in a neat European hand, dated consecutively from 1897 through 1914. The first 11 volumes are written in the Czech language. From the middle of Vol. XII on, Schwarz, who is by then living in New York, writes in English. Each notebook has a title-page stating the inclusive dates of the contents and where they were written, with the earlier volumes penned in Focsani (Romania), Paris, Zurich, Berlin, Lausanne, Charlottenburg, and Sniatyn (now Ukraine, then part of the Austro-Hungarian empire). Starting with Vol. VII (April 1902-Oct. 1903), he does his writing in the U.S. His first "American" volume was partially written in NY and St. Louis, the next in St. Louis and "Pittsburg", and from Vol. IX on, he writes solely in NY and Pittsburgh. ~ ~ Schwarz's first "American" volume was partially written in New York and St. Louis; the next in St. Louis and "Pittsburg"; and from Vol. IX on, he writes solely in NY and Pittsburgh. ~ ~ With one exception, the volumes contain his "Cugetari" (translated in later volumes as "Reflections"), and these "reflections" are consecutively numbered. They vary in length from a few lines to several pages. The "cugetari" in these notebooks start at #177, and by the end of volume XXVI, Schwarz has reached #2,326. The pages in the volumes are also consecutively numbered, from pp.1- 3,524. The "Cugetari" are scholarly thoughts on a variety of topics in philosophy and ethics, e.g. Reflection #1037: "We always try to explain the unusual in terms of the usual and this is—I think—the common source of all our illusions. Identical sensations need in abnormal circumstances a different interpretation than in normal circumstances." Scattered through several volumes are alphabetically-arranged indices of the topics addressed by these reflections, e.g. ambition, despotism, etc. Some of these topics are greatly expanded in the later indices to address many aspects, e.g. "wealth: rich, poor, capital, proletarian, worker, labor, need, old age, cooperation"; "Philistine: superiority, mass, crowd stupidity, public, imbecile...." and "social society: socialism, sociable solidarity, state, anarchism, communism." Vol. XIII departs from the numbered reflections, and contains what is apparently a dissertation or thesis titled "What constitutes moral action or Ethics from a Socialist's point of view". It is dated NY, Oct. 1908-Jan. 1909, and has a 5-page table of contents, listing such topics as "moral geniuses and their role," "sources of immorality, "can striving for social distinction be compatible with morality?" etc. His prefatory note states that he will try not to stray too far afield into areas that are merely related to his main topic--morality. ~ ~ A second anomaly is Vol. XXV, which contains the text that Schwarz titled "Philosophico Psychological Reflection upon the Various Types of Superior Men". It starts with two poems in German (one titled "To My Dearest Friend"), a quote in French by R. Topffer "Instead of a Preface", and a 5-page "table of contents." This seems to be a draft of what became his first published book. The early volumes of the notebooks (I, II, VI, VII, and VIII) also contain his poems, mostly written in German, with a few in Czech. Vol. II provides an "Index" to his poems, including where and when written, as do volumes VI and VII. The verses are on various topics, including love, but especially noteworthy, in view of OLS's later works, are the poems "Cantec sionist" (Zionist Song)—1901-02—and "Die Proletarier". ~ ~ LAID IN: Laid into Vol. XVII is a postcard, mailed from Pittsburgh 8/26/15 (past the dates of the notebooks) from OLS to "dearest Mucius", apparently a pet name for his wife, "Mrs. Anna O.L. Schwarz" in Burgettstown, Pa, a town name that is crossed out with "Pittsburg" written over it. He writes about how he's getting along doing his own cooking, how he has to "push in some additional reflection", then is hoping to take in a show, which of course I would enjoy much more with you at my side to flirt with and the two kiddies in front of us...." Also laid into that volume is an autograph note, signed, on "Hotel Pennsylvania, NY" letterhead, 7/30/19, to "My dearest

Treasure”, saying he has to start hunting for rooms, he is enclosing \$30, and commenting on the exorbitant cost of living “here...take care of each other and enjoy your trip. [signed] Your anxiously waiting Osias.” Laid into the final volume are handwritten scholarly notes (one one-page, one two-pages, one a small paragraph labeled “insert on p. 241”, as well as a page torn off a pad listing topics of various numbered “reflections” for an index). There is also a small typed paragraph. Also worthy of note, since it is outside the usual notebook contents, is a black-bordered 1-page memorial in Vol. V to “Dr. Med. Konrad Schwarz”, apparently his brother.
